

SOUTH SUDAN

South Sudan, one of the world's poorest nations, faces immense challenges:

Socioeconomic Hardships

Ranked 192 out of 193 countries on the UNDP Human Development Index, with a value of 0.381. The population is over 12.115 million, with a primarily agricultural economy heavily impacted by ongoing conflict and lack of infrastructure.

Humanitarian Crisis

Since 2013, civil conflict has displaced over 2 million internally and 2.29 million as refugees. Recent flooding has affected over 710,000 people, exacerbating food insecurity and disease outbreaks, including a severe cholera outbreak with over 24,000 cases and around 500 deaths.

Food Insecurity and Malnutrition

6.4 million people face severe food insecurity, with 1.11 million malnourished pregnant and lactating women and 2.1 million malnourished children. This number is projected to rise to 7.7 million by mid-2025.


Health and Mortality

Life expectancy is approximately 60 years, significantly below the global average. Maternal mortality is among the highest globally, with 1,150 deaths per 100,000 live births. Child mortality is also high, with 75 deaths per 1,000 children under five.

Education and Vulnerable Groups

2.2 million children are out of school, mostly girls, and 52% of girls marry before 18. The ongoing war in Sudan has displaced 960,000 people, with vulnerable groups including children, the elderly, and pregnant women.

SOLIDARITY WITH SOUTH SUDAN



Solidarity with South Sudan is an inter-congregational mission of the members of the Unions of Superiors General, women and men. It responds to the call of the Sudan Catholic Bishops' Conference who requested help in 2005 to address needs in the country after decades of civil war. Following an exploratory visit in 2006, the first projects were launched in 2008. As of March 2025, Solidarity has 22 religious members from 20 different congregations and 14 countries working on four projects. Additionally, Solidarity employs over 100 lay people, mostly South Sudanese.



Solidarity envisions a just, peaceful and inclusive South Sudan where all people and communities are empowered to lead and develop themselves and their country along with the local church as an active participant in this transformation.

MISSION

Solidarity empowers, equips and accompanies people in South Sudan with a focus on women to become dedicated, service-oriented practitioners in primary education, health, agriculture and pastoral services throughout the country. In doing this, Solidarity continues to collaborate with the Sudan and South Sudan Catholic Bishops' Conference. By developing capacities in people and institutions, Solidarity aims to create a sustainable future in which the people of South Sudan become agents of change in their society, living and promoting the values of the Gospel. As an inter-congregational collaborative commitment, Solidarity promotes harmonious intercultural living, witnessing to the Gospel.

STRATEGY 2023-2027


ETHOS

Living and promoting the Solidarity ethos will contribute to a culture of peace and assist to creatively live with diversity across ethnic groups in South Sudan. Those who are immersed in the Solidarity ethos will contribute to the ongoing transformation of society.

Solidarity aims to embed its ethos in its members, programmes, and collaborations so that they help to develop a peaceful and just society. Solidarity aspires to sustain its ethos through the people of South Sudan who have been formed by its programmes and activities.

CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT

Based on the conclusions of the 2022 Relevance & Sustainability Review, the development of professional capacity in the key sectors of education and health remains highly relevant to meeting the needs of the people of South Sudan. In addition, given the enormous levels of food insecurity, capacity development in the agricultural sector is also essential. Furthermore, capacity development within the local church, training, formation, religious accompaniment and addressing the areas of trauma and peace building remain relevant.



HOW WE DO IT

Solidarity aims to continue to develop the capacities of the people in South Sudan in primary school teaching, health care, agriculture and pastoral services and to prepare more robust institutions in view of a future transition.

EDUCATION

To prepare effective, serviceoriented primary school teachers committed to lifelong learning. service and the development of the sector. There will be a strong focus on Inservice certificate training for teachers across the country and diploma level training at Solidarity Teacher Training College (STTC) in Yambio. STTC maintains its national character (recruiting students from all Dioceses and States including Nuba Mountains and Abyei) while the Inservice training provides primary teacher formation to individual Dioceses and counties.



IHEALTH

To prepare effective, service-oriented nurses and midwives committed to lifelong learning and service. Emphasis will be placed on continuing to provide the highly sought after and necessary nursing and midwifery education and exploring opportunities to provide for additional courses. The Catholic Health Training Institute (CHTI) is a national institution recruiting students from all Dioceses and States including Nuba Mountains and Abyei.

AGRICULTURE

To promote sustainable livelihoods in families and communities through the promotion of healthy diversified diets and good nutrition practices and providing income-generating opportunities while enhancing environmental protection and maintaining biodiversity.

PASTORAL

To continue to support the local Church in South Sudan in spiritual and pastoral formation of all its members by working with and through the National Pastoral Office, local Dioceses and parishes, and religious congregations.

STTC provides **various training programs** according to the different needs and degrees of the students-teachers:

- Pre-service residential program for students from different tribes and state of the country who want to become primary school teachers.
- In-service training for practicing teachers without a qualified training. Currently underway in Yambio and from 2025 in Wau.
- A one-year **Diploma program** for skilled teachers who want to upgrade their academic qualification, preparing them for leadership and mentorship roles within schools and education systems





- Continue to prepare competent, highly motivated and effective teachers.
- To equip student teachers with peacebuilding skills, ethical principles, and a critical mindset for addressing current challenges.
- To enhance the educational opportunities for women and girls in South Sudan.
- To explore options for the further educational development for the advancement of primary school teachers
- Continue to expand the accredited Inservice Program across Dioceses and partner with stakeholders to increase access to teacher training.

CATHOLIC HEALTH TRAINING INSTITUTE

CHTI addresses the shortage of qualified personnel by training **registered nurses** and midwives from different tribes and parts of the country. The three-year residential courses, aligned with Ministry of Health and Higher Education curricula, include theoretical classes and practical internships.





CHTI is widely regarded by government ministries and by many other health agencies as **the best health training facility in the country**.

Today, the **objectives** of the CHTI programs are:

- Continue to prepare competent, highly skilled and motivated nurses and midwives.
- Elevate the Institute to offer Bachelor's degrees in Nursing and Midwifery, enhancing leadership and patient care in Church-supported facilities and aligning with global standards.
- Planning and implementation of a new Diploma in Medical Laboratory Sciences that will strengthen diagnostic capacity, improve public health surveillance, and reduce reliance on foreign assistance in South Sudan.
- To empower student teachers with peace-building skills, professional ethics, and a critical mindset.

SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURAL PROJECT RIIMENZE

The SAP-R provides training and support to local farmers to educate them in the practice of sustainable farming techniques, livestock breeding, proper family diet and savings practices, in a community development perspective.

Till now, **more than 2.700 families** were helped to increase and to **improve their capacity** and technical knowledge of **agricultural and nutritional practices**.

Today, the **objectives** of the SAP-R are:

- To continue local training, promoting sustainable farming and livestock keeping practices in a balanced, long-term agro-ecological system in 6 locations in the area.
- To develop and grow the women's savings and loans scheme.
- To promote balanced and nutritious diets with a focus on malnourished children, supporting them with distribution of locally produced nutritional supplements.
- To continue to develop a demonstration farm in which efforts and results are properly documented with a research component.
- Develop the commercial aspect of the farm, cultivating a variety of crops and livestock for sale in view of promoting a self-sustaining farm.
- To continue to support the communities through the kindergarten that cares for more then 350 children, the primary school and evening classes for adults.





Solidarity trained us about many things. For example, they trained us about good hygiene, how to cook nutritious food for our children, plus how and when to breastfeed them. (...) We are now preparing nutritious, balanced diets. We know, for example what food has proteins, what are energy foods, vitamins from fruits (...) Life is much better now. PASTORAL CARE & SERVICES

The Solidarity Pastoral Program aims to empowers South

Sudanese people towards a just and peaceful society through many activities, including trauma healing initiatives.





The program focuses on supporting vulnerable groups, particularly women, young people, displaced persons and disable people. It works with the local Church and encourage reconciliation. It also collaborates with the National South Sudanese Pastoral Coordinator and provides ongoing formation for clergy, religious, and lay individuals.

Today, the **objectives** of the Pastoral Program are:

- To promote the **empowerment of women** in church and society through capacity development programs.
- To collaborate with the local Church in the pastoral and spiritual formation of youth.
- To facilitate programs of retreats and spiritual accompaniment at the Good Shepherd Peace Centre in Kit.
- To promote trauma healing and reconciliation in an integrated manner

During Sunday masses and activities, 70% or majority are the youth. Through a variety of activities, we can be kept in church where we are taught the word of God; taught what our roles and responsibilities are in the church and within our nation. (...) PROMOTING GENDER EQUITY

By raising awareness and action on Laudato Sì and environmental issues, reviewing all project activities accordingly, advocating for biodiversity and soil conservation, increasing environmental awareness in the wider community, and fostering collaboration with other environmentally conscious groups.

Solidarity promotes peace as a core, crosscutting value. Beneficiaries from diverse South Sudanese ethnic groups—often on opposing sides of past conflicts—learn to live, study, and grow together. Through both academic and daily life, they experience firsthand that peace and reconciliation are not only possible, but essential for the future of South Sudan.

PROMOTING DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION




